#### Workshop: Improving student motivation, engagement

Research shows that since the pandemic student engagement and motivation has dropped precipitously. On Friday, Sept. 20, Daniel Willingham, of the University of Virginia, will discuss recent psychological findings on two determinants of motivation: curiosity and feelings of self-efficacy. This research suggests some novel strategies that instructors can bring to their classrooms to increase student engagement.

## Want your degree funded and a career as a diplomat?

The U.S. Department of State has four fellowship programs that pay for the student's degree and lead directly to a career as a diplomat. Two of these programs — Pickering Fellowship and Rangel Fellowship — are open now for application.

These two fellowships will pay for the student's two-year master's degree in almost any field and lead directly to a career as a foreign service officer diplomat upon graduation. The fellowships also offer a strong professional development component that includes two paid summer internships (one domestic and one overseas), an orientation program and a pairing with a mentor. Those eligible to apply now are college seniors and recent grads with a 3.2 GPA minimum who plan to start a two-year master's degree in fall 2025, and who seek a career as a foreign service officer diplomat.


### Ph.D. in Transborder and Global Human **Dynamics**


Deadline: December 1, 2024 for applicants wishing to start in Fall 2025.
