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Documentary Screening



FACULTY SCHOLAR CORNER

Development and Validation of Scores on The School Based

Advocacy and Awareness Scale (SBAAS)

The development and validation of the School-Based Advocacy Awareness Scale (SBAAS) took 18 months, and was inspired by my own experiences as a school social worker. I noticed that while advocacy is one of the most important skills school social workers (SSWs) need, there wasn't a clear way to measure what advocacy actually looks like in practice, or how we can improve it. To address this gap, myself, and Dr. Kalkbrenner developed the School-Based Advocacy Awareness Scale (SBAAS), a new tool that helps SSWs reflect on and evaluate their advocacy work at



different levels—supporting individual students (micro), schools and families (mezzo), and systems and policies (macro).

The SBAAS was tested with two groups of SSWs to make sure it accurately measures what it's designed to assess. The results supported three main areas of advocacy: advocating for student wellness, advocating for laws and policies, and confronting discrimination and bias. The scale showed strong reliability and connections with other well-known measures of advocacy. Overall, the SBAAS offers school based mental health providers a way to assess and strengthen their advocacy practice, helping ensure they are promoting equity and well-being for students and school communities at every level.









LOCAL FOOD ASSISTANCE NETWORKS!!

As a result of the ongoing shutdown of the Federal Government, food assistance in the form of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits will be suspended starting on November 1st. In anticipation of the laps in federal support the New Mexico State legislature approved \$8million in funding to support local food banks, however New Mexicans rely on \$80 – 90 million of SNAP benefits every month.

Undoubtedly, our local community in Las Cruces and our Global community across the U.S. will feel the impact of these policy decisions, emphasizing the importance of accessing and strengthening our local networks of support.



Wraparound Facilitator

UNM Medical Group, Inc. is hiring for a Wraparound Facilitator to join our Behavioral Health Clinic. This opportunity is a full time day shift opening located in Rio Rancho, New Mexico.

Minimum \$48,182 - Midpoint \$60,233*

*Salary is determined based on years of total relevant experience.

*Salary is based on 1.0 FTE (full time equivalent) or 40 hours per week. Less than 40 hours/week will be prorated and adjusted to the appropriate FTE.

About this role:

The Wraparound Facilitator is a dedicated full time position, that provides Wraparound services to youth and families in the community. Under limited supervision the Wraparound Facilitator provides intensive, supportive interventions for identified families using the Wraparound model. Such interventions include running team meetings, coordinating care with other agencies, developing and utilizing informal/formal supports, identifying and making use of family strengths, etc. Responsible for helping the child/youth and family realize their vision and increase their autonomy from formal support systems.

Summary

Under limited supervision provides intensive, supportive interventions for identified families using industry best practices and/or standards. Such interventions include running team meetings, coordinating care with other agencies, developing and utilizing informal/formal supports, identifying and making use of family strengths, etc. Responsible for helping the child/youth and family realize their vision and increase their autonomy from formal systems.

Minimum Job Requirements of a Wraparound Facilitator:

High school diploma or GED and 4 years of directly related experience. Completed degree from an accredited institution that are above the minimum education requirement may be substituted for experience on a year for year basis. Must be certified as a Wraparound Facilitator, or have the ability to become certified within eighteen (18) months from date of hire. Verification of education and licensure (if applicable) will be required if selected for hire.

Required License:

Possession of a valid unrestricted NM driver's license.

Description: During this Social Justice Teach-in participants will have the opportunity to learn from Tina Cordova, Co-founder of the Tularosa Basin Downwinders Consortium (TBDC). Through her work, Tina and the TBDC attention has been brought to the negative health effects suffered by the unknowing, unwilling, uncompensated, innocent victims of the first nuclear blast on earth that took place at the Trinity site in South Central New Mexico.

In her role as an advocate on behalf of the TBDC she has testified before several US Senate and House Committees. The passage of the Radiation Exposure Compensation Act (RECA) Amendments occurred in 2024. This brought much needed health care coverage and partial restitution to the People of New Mexico who sacrificed and suffered with the negative health effects of overexposure to radiation since 1945.

The first hour of this Teach-in will be a presentation and facilitated conversation that will be recorded, followed by an unrecorded half hour community conversation. After the real time training and discussions have concluded, enrollment will open for a self-paced asynchronous version of this learning opportunity.




