Paid Practicum Legislative Scholarship

NMSU has been awarded scholarship funding from the **New Mexico State Legislature**, and we'd like to award you!

Eligibility requirements:

- 1. Must be a New Mexico resident
- 2. Must have a **GPA of 3.0 or higher**

- 4. Must demonstrate financial need
- 5. Must **not be receiving any practicum payment** (hourly, stipend, or reimbursement)

SPRING SEMESTER GRADUATE ASSISSTANTSHIP AWARD

The Graduate School is pleased to share the 2026 Spring Semester Graduate Assistantship Award announcement for new and continuing graduate students.

The 2026 Spring Semester Graduate Assistantship Award is granted through a competitive basis. This award is for one academic semester (Spring 2026 semester) only! Nominees must be a current graduate student in good academic standing (GPA of at least 3.0 and not on Academic Probation) or admitted as a regular student to a graduate program prior to being nominated for this award.

Nominees must be hired as a Graduate Teaching Assistant or Graduate Research Assistant and not as Graduate Assistant-Other.

Students who are admitted to only Graduate Certificate programs are not eligible to be considered for this award.

The deadline is Friday, January 16, 2026, 5.00 pm.

Faculty must submit the nomination Form available at <u>2026 Spring Semester Graduate</u> <u>Assistantship Award</u> including the required information:

- 1.A written statement of about two paragraphs demonstrating how the nominee will be engaged in the teaching and/or research or creative scholarship mission of NMSU.
- 2.A retention plan that outlines specific strategies that will support the student's success in the graduate program if the nominee is not graduating in Spring or Summer of 2026.
